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How is Our School Development Plan Used?

- Guides ongoing assessment and review of goals and actions.
- Our school development plan is the driver for closing learning gaps and informs:
 - Instructional strategies
 - Professional learning
 - School structures and processes for learning
 - Resources to improve student learning
 - Data-informed decision making





School Development Plan – Overall Goal

Instructional Goal

Our students will experience improved **well-being for learning**, including a stronger sense of belonging, greater engagement and improved academic success at school, if the pathway to their learning is inclusive of all abilities and the tasks are accessible to all learners.

Instructional Actions:

Staff will...

examine how we design our learning tasks and assessments in all subject areas, including
mathematics and literacy, so that all students can optimize how they participate in the learning in a
way that best represents their learning needs.

With students, staff will...

- clearly articulate learning intentions and success criteria using student-friendly language,
- provide opportunities for students to explore and identify strategies that best support their learning needs (multiple means of engagement, representation and actions),
- provide feedback for students to use, in a variety of ways, and in response to clear success criteria,
- engage in regular opportunities for students to connect to the land as an alternative space that inspires learning,





School Development Plan – Data-informed

The measures that informed this focus include:

- class reviews in October indicated regulation and perseverance with tasks is a significant area of need
- OurSchool Survey, CBE Student Survey and Assurance Survey student response top 5 areas of need:
 - difficult to stay focused,
 - o need more opportunities to learn with different people in different spaces,
 - need to know how to make a plan to reach a goal,
 - o need opportunities to receive feedback from others,
 - need strategies to help themselves when stressed about school.
- the grades 1-4 provincial assessments indicated growth for students at-risk range; however, sustained attention and task perseverance was a barrier to further success for many students despite targeted intervention support
- Teacher perception data indicated room for continued growth and professional learning in the following guiding principles of assessment:
 - Students are actively involved in the assessment process.
 - Assessment makes explicit connections to the intended learning goals.
 - Assessment is ongoing and embedded throughout cycles of learning.







School Development Plan – School-based Processes

The school-based structures and processes that will guide our work this year include:

- Teaching Sprints to guide PLC and grade team planning
- Inclusive Task Design lesson planning tool
- CBE Assessment Calibration Protocol
- CBE Teacher Self-Assessment Tool
- Collaborative Team Meetings
- Teacher committees Jennie Connects & Belongs, Jennie Acknowledges and Jennie Gives Back
- TRC Call to Action: connection to the land learning strategies
- System and school-based Professional Learning days
- Development of Continuum of Supports
- Flexible Groupings







School Development Plan – Classroom-based Processes

The classroom-based structures and processes that will guide our work this year include:

- consistent use of clear learning intentions and success criteria
- explicit teaching of executive function strategies
- intentional opportunities to conference with students about self-assessment, goal setting and teacher feedback.
- use of Inclusive Task Design planning tool
- use of Math-Up, UFLI, Heggerty and Words Their Way resources
- Flexible literacy groupings

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Our School Budget

- Our school received \$4,401,487.00 in 2023-24 to provide a quality education to our students and meet the goals in our School Development Plan (SDP).
- At least 75 per cent of budgeted funds covers staffing and the remaining portion covers instructional and operational supplies such as, but not limited to:
- Literacy

 and numeracy classroom
 tools, manipulatives and
 resources
- Professional Development resources including First Aid cert ification for all staf
- Technology
 maintenance (ie. Laptops, iPads,
 Chromebooks, Smartboards)

- Student learning
 supplies (not covered by
 the student supplies
 fee) including art supplies
- PE equipment, recess equipment, music equipment, library books
- Materials for lunchtime clubs and intramurals
- Paper and printing costs

- Student regulation tools

 (ie. Standing desks, wobbly stools, individual timers)
- Furniture and minor building adjustments (adding coat hooks, adding bulletin boards, replacing or fixing damaged areas

- Curricular enhancement materials (e.g., art supplies, phys. ed. equipment, music equipment)








Gathering Your Feedback
